## **Procedure for co-ordinating the cultural activities of the Council of Europe and W.E.U.**

## A. Draft Recommendation

The Assembly,

Having regard to Recommendation 73 (1955);

Having regard to Resolution (51) 62 of the Committee of Ministers on the concluding of partial agreements;

Having regard to Article 3 of the European Cultural Convention, ratified by ten member countries of the Council of Europe, of which six are Members of Western European Union, providing that "the Contracting Parties shall consult with one another within the framework of the Council of Europe with a view to concerted action in promoting cultural activities of European interest";

Considering that all Members of W. E. U. are also Members of the Council of Europe;

Considering that the present cultural activities of both the Council of Europe and W. E. U. are directed towards the same goal and inspired by the same political motives,

Recommends to the Committee of Ministers :

that it prepare as soon as possible a plan for the distribution of activities among the various European institutions;

that, in so doing, it take into account the following proposals relating to the cultural tasks of W. E. U. and the Council of Europe.

1. It is desirable that eventually all cultural activities undertaken in Europe at intergovernmental level be carried out within the framework of the Council of Europe in accordance with Article 3 of the European Cultural Convention.

2. In view of the existence now of two different agencies engaged in these activities, it would be advisable for them to be brought in line by successive stages with a view to their ultimate amalgamation.

### (a) First Stage

The WEU committees of experts on cultural matters should immediately join with the experts of countries which are not Members of W. E. U. and who sit on the corresponding committees of the Council of Europe, in examining the possibility of introducing within the framework of the Council of Europe those activities of W. E. U. which have been proved fruitful in previous years.

### (b) Second Stage

After a short period of experiment in the first stage every new proposal in the cultural field, initiated by either the Council of Europe or by W. E. U., shall be examined in the first place by the committees of experts of the Council of Europe.

If it is found impossible to carry out a new project in the wider framework of the Council of Europe, it shall next be considered whether it is possible to carry it out on the basis of a partial agreement among a limited number of the countries of the Council of Europe.

If no other members outside W. E. U. are willing to join in the project, it could be carried out within the framework of W. E. U. alone.

### (c) Third Stage

Depending on the success of the first and second stages all activities in the cultural field shall take place within the framework of the Council of Europe.

At this final stage those projects in which some but not all member countries wish to participate will be carried out by the interested countries on the basis of partial agreements.

## B. II . Explanatory Memorandum

1. At the opening of the current part of the Session the Standing Committee referred to the Committee on Cultural and Scientific Questions a motion for a Recommendation submitted by M. Erl er and others, proposing that the cultural activities of W. E. U. be regarded as being based upon partial agreements concluded within the framework of the Council of Europe (Doc. 554).
2. Your Committee studied this proposal attentively in the light of the debate in the W E U Assembly on October 11th 1956, and of the report on the relations between the Consultative Assembly and the W E U Assembly, presented on behalf of the Bureau by M. Kiesinger (Doc. 541), in which he makes a further urgent appeal to the Ministers, "to draw up within this one-year period—and at the highest level—a plan for the distribution of work between the various European organisations".
3. Your Committee thought it advisable not to lay down any ready-made resolution on a matter of such importance, but to modify M. Erl er's original Recommendation by suggesting a procedure which might be followed in the single field of cultural relations, if the Assembly and the Ministers agreed on the need for closer collaboration between W. E. U. and the Council of Europe.
4. Your Committee therefore submits the present draft, which suggests a step-by-step convergence of the cultural activities of W. E. U. and of the Council of Europe. It in no way concerns the settlement of relations between the two Assemblies which is under discussion between their Bureaux. Moreover, whatever decision the Assembly may take on this experiment in the cultural field, it will have no affect upon the existing relationship between W. E. U. and the Council of Europe in other fields, as, for example, the field of social activities.
